Our Speakers

D.G. Pugh, DVM, MS, Dipl ACT, ACVN, & ACVM

David Gartrell Pugh earned both DVM and MS (Nutritional Physiology) degrees from the University of Georgia in 1981. He received post-DVM training at Virginia Tech (Clinical Nutrition) and Texas A & M University (Theriogenology). He is a Diplomate of the American College of Theriogenology (1986), the American College of Veterinary Nutrition (1992), and the American College of Veterinary Microbiology (Parasitology-Charter 2012).



Pugh has held faculty positions at the University of Georgia and Auburn University, owned a large animal practice in Georgia, has been a consulting veterinarian for Fort Dodge Animal Health and Pfizer Animal Health, and is a project veterinarian for the AUESPP. In 1990 Pugh started the Camelid Research and Teaching Program at Auburn University.

During his academic career he taught theriogenology, veterinary nutrition, and clinical parasitology. He is the author of >600 publications, >100 book chapters, 2 textbooks (Sheep and Goat Medicine, Sheep and Goat Medicine, 2nd ed), and a co-author of a publication of the NRC (NRC for Sheep, Goats, Camelids and Cervids).

Pugh has received five university and four national awards for teaching, and was the 2006 recipient of the AM Mills Award for contributions to Veterinary Medicine. He has served on various committees for the American Association of Small Ruminant Practitioners, the Society for Theriogenology, the College of Theriogenology, the American College of Veterinary Nutrition, and the National Research Council, Nutrient Requirement Committee and the American Academy of Veterinary Parasitologists.

He is a sheep, llama and donkey/mule owner, part-time motorcycle/trike builder and rider, a full-time husband to Jayne Pugh and the father of two daughters, a son, and three grandchildren.

Amanda Martabano House, DVM, DACVIM Clinical Assistant Professor; Large Animal Clinical Sciences University of Florida College of Veterinary Medicine Gainesville, FL 32610

Dr. Amanda House completed her BS in Animal Science from Cornell University in 1997. After graduating from Tufts University School of Veterinary Medicine in 2001, Dr. House completed an internship and large animal



internal medicine residency at the University of Georgia's Veterinary Teaching Hospital. She worked for two years at the University of Georgia as a Clinical Instructor in Large Animal Medicine and as the University of Georgia's Camelid Liaison. Dr. House joined the faculty at UF as a Clinical Assistant Professor in the department of Large Animal Clinical Sciences in July 2007. Her professional interests include neonatology, infectious disease, and camelid medicine. Dr. House was a speaker at the 2009 International Camelid Health Conference in Corvallis, Oregon on camelid anemia and blood transfusions.

Steven Murphy, DVM

Dr. Steve received a BS in Animal Sciences (H) from University of Maryland-College Park in 1974, and his DVM from University of Georgia in 1978. He has been in private practice in Ocala/ Marion County ever since, dealing predominantly with equine reproduction/ pediatrics and lameness. However, he has also treated many exotic species, ranging from elands, zebra, antelope, giraffe, and camel herds, to an occasional tiger, from large flocks of ostrich and emu to individual birds.
