THOUGHTS ON SHEARING CUTS

Barrel cut:

- Exposes the armpits and underbelly, areas where llamas release the most heat.
- Location of the highest quality/finest fiber for harvesting.
- Visually appealing in the show ring. Allows the neck to look longer, the body to look more robust, and disguises the natural tail set. It allows people to better assess fiber type and quality.

Lion Cut:

- Exposes the same as above, but allows for greater ventilation.
- Improves breeding practices. Removes fiber from vagina, making it safer, cleaner, and easier for penetration. Removes fiber from testicles, allowing them to stay cool and produce greater sperm count.
- Visually appealing in show ring for animals with excellent top lines, tail sets, and rear leg conformation. This cut will naturally draw the eye to these areas. If these are their faults, it will not help.
- IMO it makes an animal appear more mature.
- More prime fiber to collect for processing/use.
- Less to groom and manage.

Full Body:

- Ensure maximum comfort in your livestock to keep them cool, limit the amount of grooming they must endure, and removing any matting or cotting in the fiber.
- Improves breeding practices (see above).
- Ease of grooming for beginning showman.

The United Nations declared 2024 the International Year of Camelids (IYC 2024). The Year will highlight how camelids are key to the livelihoods of millions of households in hostile environments across over 90 countries, particularly Indigenous Peoples and local communities. From alpacas to Bactrian camels, dromedaries, guanacos, llamas, and vicuñas, camelids contribute to **food security**, **nutrition** and **economic growth** as well as holding a strong **cultural** and **social significance** for communities across the world.

Camelids play an important role in advancing the **Sustainable Develop***ment Goals* (SDGs) related to the fight against hunger, the eradication of extreme poverty, the empowerment of women and the sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems. From providing milk, meat and fibre for communities to transport for products and people, and organic fertilizer, camelids thrive where other livestock species cannot survive.

Camelids play a key role in the culture, economy, food security and livelihoods of communities in Andean highlands and in the arid and semi-arid lands in Africa and Asia, including Indigenous Peoples. Even in extreme climatic conditions they continue to produce fibre and nutritious food. Indeed, the International Year of Camelids presents a unique opportunity to raise awareness of the role of camelids in building resilience to climate change – particularly in mountains and arid and semi-arid lands.

The International Year of Camelids 2024 aims to build awareness of the untapped potential of camelids and to call for increased investment in the camelid sector, advocating for greater research, capacity development and the use of innovative practices and technologies.
