

THE LLAMA REPORTER

Today's report is on the wonderful show our FALA group put on at the Hernando County Fairgrounds. I finally have a trailer so I packed up four llamas and headed to Brooksville. The preparation was far more work than I expected. My two adult males load like pros. The yearlings, not so much. After much pleading and pushing, Tux went in for the grain. We had to lift Chisel into the trailer.

Just as I hit the road, I received a message from John Previte, our club president. I was planning to camp but the other person who was supposed to camp changed his mind, John and Paige didn't want me at the fairgrounds alone and graciously invited me to their home. Actually, it was far more than gracious. John and Paige had been setting up for the show all day and their well decided to stop working. Fortunately, it was fixed a few hours later. We've all been there, right?

I let the llamas out when I arrived to stretch their legs. Chisel was panting and shaking, poor little guy. I tied the boys on the outside hooks of the trailer and took each for a short walk. I thought my knots were fine, but Nocona found a way to get loose. The Prevites have a gate so he didn't go far and we got him back to the trailer.

I had read the program and knew there was a judge's meeting at eight a.m., but it didn't sink in that there was a meeting for all participants at nine. I came walking back from the 10th trip from my truck to see everyone sitting and waiting for me. Groan. I don't know how long they were waiting.

I skipped Showmanship because I don't know how to do it well and struggled with the other classes. I followed people as much as I could. This local show is great because even though there are awards, the purpose is fun and learning. Also, Dawn gave me great advice and even better Claudia Hammack helped me with my four boys. The Halter classes went fast, and she would bring me the right llama at the right time.

My Nocona did well but my two yearlings didn't place. Probably they would have shown better with a more experienced handler but like I said, it's a show for us newbies to learn. Chili Pepper was the only heavy wool llama, so he won all the ribbons. That was great but I would've liked more competition. CP, an intact male, was in the Best of Show class and for some reason, decided to rise up on his hind legs not once but twice. The judge, Tracy Weaver, gave me a withering look of shock and dismay. I got CP under control, and we finished the walk of shame. CP is a wonderful, beautiful and chill llama. It's up to me to learn how to show better. I was extremely proud of the yearlings, Tux and Chisel. At home, they won't walk five steps without stopping and digging in. They went right into the show ring and walked like perfect competitors.

The Halter classes went fast and there wasn't a lunch break. It was a warm day, and I was sweating into my egg salad that I scarfed down quickly to stave off hunger pains. I put Erin's other children to work fetching water and filling hay nets.

The PR and Obstacle classes went better than I expected in some ways. I only did the classes with the older males. My boys are cooperative but there were obstacles we'd never done. I wanted to show them because they're my llamas but in retrospect I wish I had asked Dawn, Claudia or Erin's children to go through the course. There were a few things I knew the llamas could do right if they had the right person to guide them. For example, turning on the bridge. I had no clue how to make that turn and walked off. Handler error. I wasn't nervous but wish I had done better. CP has stepped up onto a barrel about 100 times. Then one day he stopped. I still don't know why.

All in all, it was a good time. The members who put up the courses did a great job with some fun things and festive decorations for Halloween. Somehow, I guess because of exhaustion, I didn't take any pictures. I know others did and I hope they share them.




2024 FALA ANNUAL LLAMA TREK CREWS LAKE WILDERNESS PARK
