"Beat the Heat! Please remember to always provide plenty of water, shade, shelter, and fans for your animals. If they need shearing, please find a shearer or try it yourself! Hose down their legs and bellies only if it is really hot and they don't have access to a wading pool or sprinkler! If you can add electrolytes to their water, please do!




VENDOR/FOOD TRUCK FORM

The United Nations declared 2024 the International Year of Camelids (IYC 2024). The Year will highlight how camelids are key to the livelihoods of millions of households in hostile environments across over 90 countries, particularly Indigenous Peoples and local communities. From alpacas to Bactrian camels, dromedaries, guanacos, llamas, and vicuñas, camelids contribute to food security, nutrition and economic growth as well as holding a strong cultural and social significance for communities across the world.

Camelids play an important role in advancing the **Sustainable Development Goals** (SDGs) related to the fight against hunger, the eradication of extreme poverty, the empowerment of women and the sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems. ARE TWINS IMPOSSIBLE / – NO!

At Paradise Pastures miracles happen everyday! Here at Paradise Pastures we have a set of twins. A boy llama who weighed 14 pounds and a little girl who weighed 10 pounds.

On September 28, 2000, Elena checked on the llamas and knew prospective mom June Bug was uncomfortable. At noon there was a baby on the ground. At the time she thought she would get everything done before the rest of us got home. That's when she saw Mom delivering the second baby, got on the radio and called for help. I was only a mile away, got there quickly and grabbed towels to dry the babies off. We rubbed them for quite some time to stimulate them.

Our little girl would not nurse from Mom, even with help, until well into the night and next day. My son Cody and I slept in the barn that night to watch her and make sure she was OK. I'm not sure she would have made it on her own. She became very lethargic with the cold and seemed to want to give up. We took a hair dryer and got her really warm and then she slept in between us in two sleeping bags to keep her warm. She would hum when she had to go to the bathroom and I would let her out and then put her back.

On Saturday morning the vet called and said that her IGG was only 100 so off we went for plasma. The Smalleys had plasma and met me at the vet's office, and showed us how to tube feed.

We tube fed her every four hours just like a real baby. She slept beside our bed on a pallet, hummed when she wanted out. She would run to the barn to potty and check out Mom and play for a few minutes. I picked her up to go back inside to bed.

We did not have cria coats, so improvised. Little Miracle spent a lot of time in the house but did get to laze in the sun, and be introduced to our baby donkey.

Who would have thought a llama would wake you up to go to the bathroom and eat. She is perfectly trained and we did nothing.

No one actually thought this 10-pound twin would make it, but she has done well. On November 3 she weighed 20 pounds. She isn't sleeping in the house anymore, but is still getting supplemental feedings until she finds the grain. These two are beautiful and full of life. Our Little Miracle runs just like the others even if she is last. It does look funny to see her in with all the other llamas. She looks like a little dwarf chasing after giants.
