RESCUE RUMINATIONS

Southeast Llama Rescue Annual Report for 2017.

Total surrenders: 159 (Alpacas: 110, Llamas: 48. Guanaco: 1)

Placed: (includes re-homes and permanent fosters): Alpacas: 104, llamas: 73

Total: 177

Died: 19. Of those, 2 were surrendered but remained on owner property, 12 were animals previously placed, 5 died in foster care (several from old age or the after effects of cruelty in the case of two that came in via humane seizure)

Remaining in Foster care: 31 with 4 of those pending adoption.

This is the lowest number in foster care in years!! Our goal is to get those in foster to their permanent homes.

Observations:

- A couple of seizures involving both llamas and alpacas added to mortality numbers for 2017 and the intake of a number of fairly old animals will probably flow into 2018.
- The preferred method to place older and compromised animals is to adopt them out with fees waived, however many are being placed as permanent fosters more often in order to place them at all. Since SELR funds both the costs of necessary supplementation as well as medical costs over and above those normally incurred, these animals represent the potential for significant expenses going forward as virtually all are medically compromised or very old (or both!).
- The numbers of alpacas being surrendered is more reflective of herd sizes vs. number of owners surrendering. It is becoming routine to have herds of 15+ plus surrendered.
- The increased numbers of intact males have been a financial burden and it isn't getting any better. Some of the vets in the NE as well as some NC vets routinely quote \$300 and up (sometimes way up!) to geld which probably explains why their owners are not gelding. If not for U.T. Farm days and the UGA vet school we would not be able to accept so many intact animals.
- · More aggressive male alpacas are being surrendered and are tying up foster space. Several are too dangerous to be adopted and will likely become permanent fosters or will have to be euthanized if they continue to escalate.






