ALPACA WEAVING CLASS

Hi Everyone:

I am so excited, Roo Kline will be coming to Florida to teach her Alpaca Weaving class. Reserve your spot now. Space is limited. Please fee free to share this with others who might be interested.

Date: February 16-17, 2019. 9am - 5pm

PART 1: textured spinning (Roo Kline, assisted by Amy Shelton)

Colour theory, carding, textured spinning with beehives and coils. Participants must already be comfortable with

basic spinning and plying, and must bring their own (or a borrowed) wheel with a large orifice, as well as two bobbins and a lazy kate.

PART 2: textured weaving on a rigid heddle loom (Amy Shelton, assisted by Roo Kline)

Weaving on rigid heddle loom using the yarn spun the day before. Woven pieces will then be used to make an alpaca-shaped decorative pillow to take home .

PRICE: \$175 per participant for one day \$250 per participant for both days

The instructor is extending a 15% discount to you for each FALA member.

ALL MATERIALS ARE INCLUDED!

Although the instructor will bring a number of looms, her studio partner, Amy, being a Schacht dealer, is going to offer a tax free deal for those who would like to purchase a loom in advance - it is \$195 for a 15" Cricket loom. Folks can order directly from her before class (I can set up a payment link to pay Amy directly through PayPal). She will have them shipped to the farm.





About the Farm: Sun Spiced Alpacas started in 2003 with a dream to escape back to the country. We have a 20-acre farm in Homosassa dedicated to breeding fine-fibered Suri alpacas. Our farm started as 20 acres of wild woods that we have slowly cleared and fenced to become the home for our alpacas.

About the Animals: Sun Spiced Alpacas is home to 25 fine-fibered



Suri alpacas. We started 15 years ago with a dream, and now, it is a reality. We are also home to plenty of chickens, white peacocks, Sebastopol geese, cats, and 3 rescued Rhodesian Ridgebacks. Our Suri alpacas sport many Championship ribbons, but our primary focus is on the fiber. Our most recent addition is our herdsire Goldstar's Handilock with a full array of Championship, Reserve Champion, even BEST Luster awards, and a 19.3 micron fleece. Most of our mature alpacas are showing lingering fineness with low micron fleeces even at advanced years.

About the People: Mike retired from his position as an English professor to focus on the day-to-day care of Sun Spiced Alpacas. Sheila is hoping to retire soon from her Clinical Microbiology computer job. Alpaca fiber has become the focus of our farm, so Sheila will be spinning, felting, and weaving to make her own special fiber art. We both love to teach others about our farm experiences and fiber arts.

Here is the llama SELR rescued from WI. Left alone, owner couldn't care for him. He is totally covered in burrs, and it took them two hours to wrangle him, but once she got a collar on him (no halter with that damaged nose!), he walked and loaded well. She will call the vet tomorrow and work on the burrs.

That's a very illustrative reason why you don't leave halters on a llama/ alpaca long term. Or at all, in my opinion.
